## Semester Final: The Monologue

#### **Project Description:**

Taking all the fundamentals of performance we have worked with over the semester, you will be performing a memorized monologue. Your teacher will give you a character monologue and you will need to memorize by the due date. You will then have time to work on it in class. You will need to have two student critique performances completed by the final class performance.

1. Students will receive their selected monologues.

#### **Procedure**

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2.	Students will have all of winter break to memorize their monologue. The memorization test/performance will be given on

4.	Starting, students will perform their monologues for the class.  This performance will be worth 100 points and will make up a significant portion of your grade.

- You will only receive 1 paper copy of the monologue from me. Please take a picture of the monologue with your phone or do your best to not lose it.
- You must memorize your monologue word for word. The writer wrote the words the way they were meant to be performed.
- If you have any issues with the content of the monologue, please talk to me BEFORE ASAP. Disliking the monologue will not be an excuse to ignore the memorization process.
- Performing a monologue that is not memorized will result in an incomplete score that receives a

### **Monologue Memorization Techniques**

- 1. Memorize lines while blocking your movements.
- 2. Have a friend feed you the lines.
- 3. Say the lines out loud.
- 4. Make cue cards.
- 5. Cover the script with another sheet of paper except the line you are saying. Glance down at that line and pick up as much as the eye allows you. Look up and say the line aloud, slowly. Repeat this pattern through the entire page.
- 6. Split the monologue into parts (beats) and memorize one part at a time.
- 7. Tape record yourself reading the lines and listen to the recording.
- 8. Read and reread and reread and reread and....
- Repeat the line three times while looking at the script and then put the script down and repeat the line. Then keep adding lines so that you can do three lines without holding the script.
- 10. Do whatever you have to do to memorize the script.
